From the Editor: The following column is intended to provide our readers an update on fire service activities from around the state.

Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal Valet Trash Raising Concerns Among the Fire Service Community



Door-side waste and recycling collection from apartments, also known as valet trash, has been offered to many residents in numerous different multifamily builds for years. Valet trash collection services allow residents of multifamily buildings to place trash cans in hallways where they are eventually collected and emptied by the trash collection service. There is no set frequency for collection. The practice eliminates the need for residents to carry trash bags or cans outside or to a garbage collection room. The concern with valet trash is unknown combustible and possibly highly dangerous and hazardous materials are now being stored in corridors or hallways.

The OSFM has voiced concerns over the lack of control over what is placed in these garbage containers, because most municipalities or fire protection districts have no control over what is being stored or used within the privacy of dwelling units that will use this service. The OSFM participates on the Technical Committees that prepare NFPA 1, Fire Code (adopted by many local authorities in Illinois) and NFPA 101, Life Safety Code (OSFM adopts the 2015 edition of this code) and is active on the ICC's Fire Code Action Committee (FCAC) that is developing the International Fire Code (IFC). OSFM has been working closely with the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF) and the National Association of State Fire Marshals (NASFM) to keep language permitting this service out of NFPA 1, NFPA 101, and the IFC.

Multiple organizations were successful in keeping language permitting to this service out of NFPA 1 and NFPA 101 and are currently working to keep it out of the IFC. The national IAFF as well as NASFM have submitted a letter to the FCAC opposing valet trash staging:

All organizations stand strongly against all fire code language which would allow this practice. The proposed text for valet trash services is in direct conflict with proven fire safety principles which have been in place for decades. The prohibition of combustible materials within the means of egress is a sacred, tried and true fire safety method to protect building occupants and firefighters alike. Allowing trash and refuse to be stored in exit access routes, exit corridors and/or hallways creates unnecessary fire safety risk, as well as additional firefighting hazards.

When opposing the action during NFPA votes, Catherine Stashak of the Illinois State Fire Marshal's Office stated: "Protecting the means of egress from obstructions and hazards is paramount to the mission of life safety principles." "NFPA 1 and 101 specifically prohibits the introduction of high hazards into, or travel through, an area with high hazards."

During the online 2020 NFPA Technical Meeting, members voted against the codes allowing valet trash collection services into NFPA 1 and NFPA 101. Voting for the IFC is still forthcoming.

It is a busy time of year for the Illinois Fire Service Institute (IFSI) as the Spring 2021 training season is now in full swing. On 1 March, we welcomed thirty-eight students representing twenty-three departments to the State Fire Academy. Over the course of seven weeks, the candidates will complete essential, hands-on training designed to give new firefighters the practical and cognitive skills needed to operate safely and effectively on the fireground. In addition to this resident Academy program, the IFSI team continues to deliver the Basic Operations Firefighter Blended (BOF) program at four regional training locations across the state. This blended training effort will wrap up in early May.

In the past month, we have also offered courses in the Engine Company Operations, Advanced Technician Firefighter (ATF), Smoke Divers, Truck Company Operations, Structural Collapse Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Officer, Leadership Development and Decision Making, Investigation and Prevention, and NIMS/ICS Programs. This list does not include the countless Cornerstone Program training opportunities available across the state.

We are busy! But, we remain focused on our efforts to provide top-quality and relevant training opportunities to all areas of the state.

Our first virtual conference was at the end of March and went very well. With the exception of Monday having over 90 people in attendance, the other four days each had over 70. It is interesting to note that due to the virtual format we had attendees from six states. The feedback we have heard were that the speakers were great, and many enjoyed the virtual format.

In mid-summer we will begin the process of planning for the 2022 conference. Ideally, we'd like to do an in-person format, as we believe there is much to be learned by being together. If anyone has ideas regarding conference topics or speakers for next year, please let our office know.

In April we will again begin monthly virtual mini-seminars. April's will be on Amusement Rides and Tents, and May's will be on Fire Alarm Plan review. Registration will be available soon on our website.

In June we will be offering a Fire Inspector 2 class in New Lenox, so if you are in need of that class make sure you let the office know, as there will be attendance caps due to distancing concerns.

We are joining forces with other Illinois Fire Service organization to attempt to stop a bill that seeks to allow the grouping of firework tubes with a total of 500 grams of pyrotechnic mix in it to be made available for general public use in Illinois. This amount is the highest allowed by the Federal Government before being considered a "commercial grade." This video link shows the device, that will shoot sparks for over five minutes, without

Vision 20/20 has developed Discovery, a new free online CRR Data Hub tool that embraces the progressive mindset that data brings to the fire service. It is located at <https://strategicfire.org/discovery>

Discovery's easy-to-use and intuitive interface provides a means to graphically explore service areas at multiple levels, from a national perspective down to the station level. This is possible through the use of census tracts, and the tool provides basic detail to organizations that have previously been unable to examine their data because of limited resources, knowledge or skills. This is instrumental in developing a Community Risk Assessment, the first step in Community Risk Reduction. Discovery Data Hub provides you with the tools you need for insights into the risks in your community, including demographics, fire and EMS incidents, heart disease, stroke and more. Developed with an AFG Fire Prevention and Safety Grant, this is an invaluable resource for any department looking to write grants, develop a Community Risk Assessment or Community Risk Reduction Plan.

For your educators, the NFPA has come out with the 2020 Educational Messaging Desk Reference [HERE](#). For ease of use, the 2020 edition includes hyperlinks from the Table of Contents to specific chapters within the document. In addition to updated messages throughout (indicated by the word NEW), the 2020 edition includes:

There are new chapters on pet fire safety and youth firesetters, as well as new sections on Carbon Monoxide – boating and marinas; Home Fire Escape - people who are deaf or have hearing loss, use a mobility device and are blind or have low vision; Fire Safety Away from Home - peer-to-peer hospitality, motor home, camper and recreation vehicle safety, safety in places of public assembly, car fire safety; Cooking - microwave ovens, gas grills; Electrical- pools, hot tubs, and spas, equipment safety, marine and boating safety; Candle - how to burn a candle, candles for religious/ceremonial use in homes; Outdoor burning – campfire safety, fire pit safety, recreational fire use; Flammable and Combustible Liquid and

Gases – propane gas safety, propane appliance maintenance, gel fuel safety; and Battery Safety – 9-volt batteries, battery disposal.

A sign with the following text was spotted in another State: "This store is open to all members of the public who want to shop, dine and drink here. The store is not open to anyone with an ulterior motive for entering, such as code enforcement. Collier County and its Code Enforcement Officers are hereby place on written notice that they may not enter upon the interior or exterior of these premises without a warrant issued by a Court of law. All such entries shall be deemed a trespass. The "premises" for purposes of the Notice, includes the exterior of the building. So if you are a County Code enforcement officer and are reading this Notice without a warrant, you likely have already engaged in an illegal and unconstitutional search."

There is also a bill in California that could impact inspectors if it passes. It basically says without a warrant they would be unable to inspect. Prior to encountering something like this you may want to get you legal team's understanding of your right to inspect.

MABAS

As the COVID 19 Pandemic continues, so does the response MABAS, and the MABAS Divisions, have been providing. Since March 2020, each of the 69 MABAS Divisions has provided some form of support in the battle against the virus. The most common request of assistance is the delivery and set-up of shelter tents at hospitals and correctional facilities for virus testing and treatment. These tasks are winding down as the State moves into vaccine distribution and the calls for assistance in this area ramp up. The strength of the statewide fire service mutual aid network really shows in it's ability to adapt to this new threat and is something we all should be proud of.

Unfortunately, the pandemic meant that MABAS had to cancel its 2021 Command and Dispatchers Summit last February. The 9-1-1 Dispatchers were

especially hard hit by the cancellation as the Summit is one of the few training opportunities available to the rank-and-file dispatchers who are a vital component of our emergency preparedness. We are looking forward to resuming the 2022 MABAS Command and Dispatchers Summit next February and to resuming support of statewide and local response exercises that have had to be curtailed due to pandemic restrictions.

The Illinois Terrorism Task Force is evaluating proposals from various state and local agencies for funding out of the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Homeland Security and Urban Area Security Grant programs. These grants are the lifeblood of MABAS's ability to support and maintain the training and equipment that is in place to respond to all hazards. Unfortunately, the amount of funds available in these grants have been shrinking dramatically over the past few years. Also, additional rules under the grant program require funding of programs that are not necessarily related to the all hazards response capability of MABAS. Should this trend continue in the future, alternative means of funding will have to be found to continue to support the MABAS capability.
