The **Serena Fire Department** is finally closing in on being able to use its new training facility after 10 years of planning and saving money.

The department, which boasts about 40 volunteer members in the district that covers 130 square miles, already has a building in Serena air pack training, but the new facility will allow firefighters to train for dozens of other situations they may encounter on a fire call.

The training facility was funded completely by donations from many businesses and residents within the district.

"It was just the money ... it took a long time to raise it," Serena Fire Chief Steve Kellogg said of the decade-long project that cost \$228,000. "We didn't want to use any tax money for this. We send out fundraising letters to let people know what we were doing every year and asked for donations. Kellogg credited companies, businesses and residents for making the plan a reality.

The training facility is made of five connecting, specially designed shipping containers built and installed by American Fire Training Systems Inc. from Lockport.



Grantfork Volunteer Fire Department welcomed Truck 2970 quick response and brush truck designed by the department to their fleet. They are particularly excited about how it will assist them on field fires, structure fires, and motor vehicle accidents.

As a dual purpose truck, it has many different features that work in tandem with each other for a tactical advantage on scenes: 4-wheel drive, a water/foam spraying gun controlled from inside the cab, numerous high voltage lights, and two reels of ready-to-go booster line. As a quick response truck, it has the ability to pump and store water, easy navigation, cache of battery operated extrication tools, and two SCBA.

The purchase is attributed to the support of many individuals. The GVFD would like to especially thank their department's truck committee, their dedicated district, and their extremely supportive community.
